Performed by the children of Dartington Primary School as part of the Stories from Around The World Multicultural Arts Festival



This play involved 35 children from Dartington Primary School who rehearsed after school to deliver 2 performances during the Stories from Around the World Multicultural Arts Festival 1998.

The play was an adaptation of the speech of Chief Seattle in 1854 in response to the President of the United States sending work that he wished to purchase Native American Indian land.

Joanna wrote the script and score, and spent the winter designing and making all the costumes, including masks, the eagle costume, and head dresses following traditional designs where possible. All the props were also designed and made by Joanna.

She also researched traditional dances and incorporated them into the play including the Air Dance, the Animal Dance, the Great Eagle Death Dance, the Horse Tail Dance and the Wind Dance.

The President in Washington sends word that he wished to buy our land. But how can you buy or sell the sky? The land? The idea is srange to us. If we do not own the freshness of the air and the sporkle of the water, how can you buy them?

Every part of this earth is sacred to my people. Every shining pine needle, every saudy shore, every miss in the dark woods, every meadow, every humming insect. All are holy in the memory and experience of my people

We know the sam hat courses through the trees as we know the blood that courses through our vens. We are part of the earth and it is part of us. The perfumed flowers are our sisters. The bear, the deer, the great eagle, these are our brothers. The rocky crests, the juices in the meadow, the body heat of the pony, and man, all belong to the same family.

The shining water that moves in he streams and rivers is not just water, but the bload of our areestors. If we sell you our land, you must remember that it is sacred. Each ghost y reflection in he clear waters of the lakes tells of events and memories in the life of my people. The water's murmur is the voice of my fathers father

The rivers are our brotheri. They quench our thirst. They carry our canoes and feed our children. So you must give to the rivers he kincness you would give to any brother. If we sell you our land, remember that the air is precious to us, that the air shares its spirit with all life it supports. The wind that gave our grandfather his first breath also receives his last sigh. The wind also gives our children the spirit of life.

So if we sell you cur land, you must keep it apart and sucred, as a place where man can go to taste the wind that is sweetened by the meadow flowers.

Will you such your children what we have taught our children? That the earth is our mother? What befa is the earth befalls all the som and daughters of the earth.

This we know the earth does no belong to man, man belongs to the earth. All things are connected like the blood the unites us all. Man did not weave the web of life, he is merely a strand in it. Whatever he does to the web, he does to humself

Ore thing we know our god is also your god. The earth is prectous to him and to harm the earth as to heap contempt on its creator.

Your destiny is a mystery to us. What will happen when the huffishn are all slaughtened? The wild horses tamed? What will happen when the secret corners of the lorest is heavy with the somt of many men and the view of the ripe hill is blotted by taking wres? Where will the theket be! Gonel Where will the Eagle be? Ovne! And what is it to say goodbye to the swift pory and the hunt? The end of living and the beginning of survival.

When the last red man has vanished with his wildarness and his memory is only a shadow of a cloud moving across the prairie, will these shores and forests still be here? Will there se any spirit of my people left?

We love this earth as a new-born loves its mothers heartbeat. So, if we sell you our land, love it as we have loved it. Care for it as we have cared for it. Hold in your mind the memory of the Preserve the land for all children and love it, as God loves us all

As we are part of the land you to) are part of the land. This earth is proctous to us. It is also precious to you. Use thing we know: there is only one God. No man, he he Red Man or White Man, can be spart.
